SUNDAY EVENING 6:00PM	The procession of the Bridegroom Icon entering the church and set out for 4 days.	Behold, the Bridegroom comes at midnight, and blessed is the servant whom He shall find watching; and again, unworthy is the servant whom He shall find heedless. Beware, therefore, O my soul, do not be weighed down with sleep, lest you be given up to death and lest you be shut out of the Kingdom.		
WEDNESDAY 2PM / 6PM	Holy Unction is a Sacrament of anointing with oil for healing of body and soul and forgiveness of sins.			
Thursday Morning 8AM	The Reserved Sacrament (Eucharist in the tabernacle on the altar) is replaced today. Look for small cubes of Holy Communion that are intincted, that is to say the consecrated wine is touched to each piece and they are set out to dry.			
Thursday Night 6PM	We read the 12 Passion Gospels throughout the service of Matins.			
Friday Afternoon 2:00PM	There is a Burial Procession outside with Epitaphios, Plaschanicja, the Burial Shroud/Icon of Christ. Christ is placed in a tomb of flowers during the Gospel reading before this procession Christ's icon is taken off of the cross and wrapped in a white shroud and placed in the Sanctuary for 40 days.			
Friday Evening 6:00PM	During this service of Matins we sing special hymns called "The Lamentations" and the tomb of Christ holding the Burial Shroud is anointed with fragrant holy water and the entire tomb is carried outside showing the Life of Christ moving like light in the darkness of Hades as He shares Life with those imprisoned there.			
SATURDAY Morning! 8:00AM	ARISE O' GOD!!! We sing and hear of Christ's resurrection and the children ring bells and the priest throws the sign of victory all over the church: bay leaves!

both sacramentally and with these Pascha Basket traditions together. Here are a few of the Slavic Traditional items that have been enjoyed for centuries in those regions. They largely are food items that celebrate getting to break the fast... so butter, eggs, meats, cheese... you can see how heavy and rich the flavors are and why they are fitting for the Feast of

Words to today's special hymn for Lazarus Sat and Palm Sunday

Rejoice, rejoice, O Bethany! On this day God came to thee, And in Him the dead are made alive, As it is right for He is the Life.

When Martha went to receive Him, Grieving loudly with bitter tears, She poured out the sorrow of her heart to Him With great sadness, wailing her lament.

She at once cried out unto Him: "My most compassionate Lord, my Lord, At the great loss of my brother Lazarus My heart is broken, help me."

Jesus said to her, "Cease your weeping, Cease your grieving and sad lament; For your brother, My most beloved friend, Lazarus, Very soon will live again."

Then He, the faithful Redeemer, Made His way unto the tomb, Where he cried unto him who was buried four days, Calling him forth, saying "Lazarus, arise."

Come with haste, ye two sisters, And behold a wondrous thing, For your brother from the tomb has returned to life. To the beloved Redeemer now give thanks.

> To Thee, O Lord of creation, We kneel down in reverence profound, For all we who are dead in sin, In Thee, O Jesus, are made alive.

Tell me about Lazarus...

(This past Saturday he is called from the tomb!)



How Lazarus Saturday is celebrated in Cyprus

Lazarus Saturday before Palm Sunday, Saturday of the sixth week of Great Lent. On this day, the Orthodox Church remembers the miracle of the resurrection of Christ by the righteous Lazarus.

Lazarus Saturday is especially dear to the residents of Larnaca (the third largest city in Cyprus), because Saint Lazarus is the patron saint of their city.

-In the center of Larnaca stands the Agios Lazaros temple, known to every Cypriot and every guest of Cyprus, that is, a temple built in honor of St. Lazarus. It still houses a stone sarcophagus in which Lazarus was once buried.



According to the tradition, children on Lazarus Saturday in Cyprus gather in groups of several people and go around the houses in the neighborhood, inviting everyone to listen to the hymn in honor of St. Lazarus. The anthem ends with the words: "May the Mother of God, Christ and St. Lazarus help you!" Previously, singing could still be accompanied by a small theatrical act, when one of the young artists portrayed the dead Lazarus, whom Christ returns to life. They chose the most beautiful little boy in the neighborhood, who got the main role of

Lazarus. He was laid on a bedspread decorated in flowers in a separate room of the temple. The reading of the Gospel began, and then, after the words of Christ "Lazarus! Come out!", The main character of the show rose, thus symbolizing resurrection.

Women sprinkled him with holy water and put some bread and wine in his mouth. Following this, the performance of the solemn hymn in honor of the saint began. And the holiday ended with a small treat - baked with traditional spicy cookies "lazarakia", resembling a human figure, which was served to all participants and all assembled spectators.

On Lazarus Saturday, palm wreaths are certainly woven and decorated with flowers:



beautiful gladioli and yellow daisies. Two thousand years separate us from that time, but the events of the past have not lost their significance today. And the memory of the holy man named Lazarus is carefully preserved in the hearts of the descendants - those to whom he once brought the light of Christianity. - Shared from a friend of Fr. Jonathan

St. Ephriem the Syrian On the Death of Jesus

Death trampled our Lord underfoot, but he in his turn treated death as a highroad for his own feet. He submitted to it, enduring it willingly, because by this means he would be able to destroy death in spite of itself. Death had its own way when our Lord went out from Jerusalem carrying his cross, but when by a loud cry from that Cross he summoned the dead from the

underworld, death was powerless to prevent it.

Death slew him by means of the body which he had assumed, but that same body proved to be the weapon with which he conquered death. Concealed beneath the cloak of his manhood, his godhead engaged death in combat; but in slaying our Lord, death itself was slain. It was able to kill natural human life, but was itself killed by the life that is above the nature of man.

Death could not devour our Lord unless he possessed a body, neither could hell swallow him up unless he bore our flesh; and so he came in search of a chariot in which to ride to the underworld. This chariot was the body which he received from the Virgin; in it he invaded death's fortress, broke open its strong room and scattered all its treasure.

At length he came upon Eve, the mother of all the living. She was that vineyard whose enclosure her own hands had enabled death to violate, so that she could taste its fruit; thus the mother of all the living became the source of death for every living creature. But in her stead Mary grew up, a new vine in place of the old. Christ, the new life, dwelt within her. When death, with its customary impudence,



came foraging for her mortal fruit, it encountered its own destruction in the hidden life that fruit contained. All unsuspecting, it swallowed him up, and in doing so released life itself and set free a multitude of men.

He who was also the carpenter's glorious son set up his Cross above death's all-consuming

jaws, and led the human race into the dwelling place of life. Since a tree had brought about the downfall of mankind, it was upon a tree that mankind crossed over to the realm of life. Bitter was the branch that had once been grafted upon that ancient tree, but sweet the young shoot that has now been grafted in, the shoot in which we are meant to recognize the Lord whom no creature can resist.

We give glory to you, Lord, who raised up your Cross to span the jaws of death like a bridge by which souls might pass from the region of the dead to the land of the living. We give glory to you who put on the body of a single mortal man and made it the source of life for every other mortal man.

You are incontestably alive! Your murderers sowed your living body in the earth as farmers sow grain, but it sprang up and yielded an abundant harvest of men raised from the dead.

Come then, my brothers and sisters, let us offer our Lord the great and all-embracing sacrifice of our love, pouring out our treasury of hymns and prayers before him who offered his Cross in sacrifice to God for the enrichment of all.

CHURCH ETIQUETTE:

How do we care for and show respect in our church?

We care for the sacred space by maintaining a prayerful mind/mouth/heart.

"Wisdom arise Let us attend!" is heard often; we are not passive onlookers during services but active participants. Which is why we don't cross our legs like we're sitting in a meeting or watching a film.

We come to Church as we are... but we do not stay as we are. With a Spiritual Father we are encouraged to transcend and continue to grow. In the spirit of educating newer members and reminding older members of every age, please take the following information to heart:

STILLNESS: Hesychia:

The Nave and the entrance Narthex are places of prayer. If they are holy during services, then they should be treated as holy at all times. Coffee Hour is where conversations should be

enjoyed.

Before Liturgy Fr. Jonathan is remembering the names of the living and the dead during Proskomedi, at times hearing confessions and we know people are praying and looking for stillness. Please can greet each other and help with what newer members may need... but conversations are to be kept in the church basement lest we forget where we are.

CLOTHING:

We wear the best we have and as this is a church we wear modest clothing. Every Liturgy is considered a marriage feast between God and His People.

LIPSTICK:

It will damage hand-painted icons. This is something to consider as we prepare to get new iconography in the church. The Burial Shroud we bring out on Holy Friday has lipstick on the body of Christ. When wiping off lipstick we risk scraping the varnish and the paint. The struggle is real.

CROSSING OUR LEGS IN CHURCH:

If you need to cross your legs because of a medical condition then much like anyone who needs to eat before Holy Communion because of medical needs is allowed to. However, how we present ourselves in God's house will affect how engaged we are in actively worshiping. Stand if you are able to stand. Sit if you have to sit. Cross your legs if you have a medical condition. But we do not cross our legs in Church because we are spiritual participants in the Heavenly Worship.
